

ELECTRONIC COMPONENT NEWS, Jul, TELLS THE FULL STORY OF IC SOCKETS.

WORLDRADIO NEWS, Jul, has a thought-provoking editorial, many short items on various facets of amateur (never "ham") radio, a highly-readable account of a commercial HF point-to-point station in the '30s, good words of advice to those bold souls who tackle building the SB-104, many special-interest "columns" like Marine, Aeronautical, Traffic, FM, Novice, Training, etc. The trapped multiband dipole is "re-invented" by W6GWL! Don't miss the M-Tron adv, which shows that advs don't have to be boring!

ELECTRONIC TECHNICIAN/DEALER, Jul, courtesy of W5KE, deals well with "exotic" semiconductors, then gives a quickle course on DBs. Another article concerns the many types of capacitors; it has several questionable statements.

HAM RADIO, Aug, STARTS WITH A THOUGHT-PROVOKING EDITORIAL AND THEN PRESENTS A SERIES OF WELL-WRITTEN TECHNICAL ARTICLES, MOSTLY FOR ADVANCED AND WELL-MONIED EXPERIMENTERS AND CONSTRUCTORS.

ONE EXCEPTION SHOWS HOW TO MAKE A TWO-FET CW TRANSMITTER.

73, Aug, continues its series on the Helical Antenna, starts a series on a digital readout VSWR indicator, ganders the DVM scene (omits the new one from Radio Shack), has a follow-on to the Accu-Keyer, gives some pointers on getting the best out of TV sweep tubes (but spoils it in the next-to-the-last paragraph by some fiction about VSWR), talks about logic circuits, presents good stuff on multiband dipoles, has a staff article on remote VFOs, tells how to get good front-to-back ratios from Yagi antennas, and presents Wayne's editorial comments. He's taking over a magazine for digital freaks; perhaps we'll see more <u>radio</u> articles in 73!

TECHNICAL REVIEW (CONTD)

SHORT WAVE MAGAZINE, Jul, Describes two VSWR indicators suitable for very low power applications. Another article describes the construction of a tube-type 144 MHz RF section of simple design. The practical results of using an RF type of speech "clipper" and its comparison with an AF variety makes interesting reading.

RADIO COMMUNICATION, Jul, has its Golden Jubilee edition with many intriguing glimpses of the past. Technical articles include one on a 144 MHz quad antenna with switched polarization, a prescaler for 144 MHz, and the conclusion of its series on diodes. As usual, its Technical Topics section is laden with items of interest, one being on band-changing with diode switches, another on a phase-locked VHF VFO. Still another, very intriguing, is on Single Sideband CW!

RADIO ELECTRONICS, Sep, unlike most issues, has several items worth reading. An article on MATV antennas contains useful information. So does an installment on "All About Oscilloscopes."
Two or three other titles promised interest, then proved to be dull and non-informative.

POPULAR ELECTRONICS, SEP, IS AN UTTER LOSS!

CQ, Aug, Tells the good and the bad of Heathkits SB-104, Repeats Radio Communication's article on quads and loops, mouths some sour grapes on W2DU's destruction of myths about VSWRs, and has comments on license proposals.

ELECTRONIC ENGINEERING TIMES, 11 Aug, Quotes a design engineer as saying semiconductor manufacturers haven't come up with RF power devices sufficiently linear for good SSB amplifiers. Wonder what Atlas, Swan, Ten-Tec, et al, have to comment?

WORLDRADIO NEWS, Aug, IS A PRIME EXAMPLE OF ALL THAT IS GOOD IN PRESENTING THE POSITIVE, THE AFFIRMATIVE, THE FAVORABLE ASPECTS OF AMATEUR RADIO. It's Deliberately light on technical articles BUT BEARS DOWN HEAVILY AND EFFECTIVELY OF WHAT AMATEUR RADIO IS DOING FOR THE BENEFIT OF MANKIND. AND GIVES HINTS ON HOW YOU CAN CONTRIBUTE IN THAT VITAL FIELD!

Steve Hoffman, who wrote the article appearing on page 9 of the 2L July Issue of The Oklahoma Journal, deserves a pat on the back and a resounding "Well done!" from the local amateur radio fraternity. 

- 1. Mr. Jeffrey M. Bixby has requested that the time for filing reply comments in the above captioned matter be extended to September 16, 1975.

- 5. Accordingly, IT IS ORDERED, pursuant to Sections 0.131, 0.331, and 1.46 of the Commission Rules and Regulations that the time for filing reply comments in the above-captioned matter be EXTENDED from August 18, 1975, to September 1, 1975.



ROLLING RADIO BACK 46 YEARS

In 1929 AMATEUR RADIO WAS UNDERGOING A TRYING PERIOD. THE FEDERAL RADIO COMMISSION HAD JUST ORDAINED THAT AMATEUR TRANS-MITTERS COULDN'T WOBBLE ALL OVER A BAND; THEY HAD TO HAVE A CERTAIN DEGREE OF FREQUENCY STABILITY. THIS COULD BE HAD BY CRYSTAL CONTROL, BUT CRYSTALS WERE NOT ONLY HARD TO OBTAIN, THEY WERE DISTRESSINGLY EXPENSIVE. THEN, TOO, THEY NECESSITATED MULTI-STAGE TRANSMITTERS, SOMETHING THE AVERAGE AMATEUR VIEWED AS FRIGHTENINGLY COMPLEX; THE NECESSITY OF NEUTRALIZATION JUST PLAIN SCARED THE SOX OFF MOST RADIO OPERATORS (PROFESSIONAL AS WELL AS AMATEUR).

THE ARRL TECHNICAL STAFF TACKLED THE PROBLEM OF DESIGNING A TRANSMITTER THAT WOULD COMPLY WITH FRC REQUIREMENTS YET BE WITHIN THE CONSTRUCTIONAL CAPABILITIES AND THE FINANCIAL CAPABILITIES OF NEARLY ALL ITS MEMBERS. THEIR LABORS RESULTED IN THE "1929 TRANSMITTER," A STATE-OF-ART JOB. IT WAS STABLE, IT WAS SIMPLE TO BUILD...AND IT WORKED BEAUTIFULLY!

Its basis was a Hartley oscillator, one built with short leads, one mechanically solid, one with high capacitance and low inductance in its RF tank circuit. For 80, 40 and 20 meter work, the variable capacitor was one nanofarad (1000 picofards), and the inductors, which had to be changed for each band, were wound of copper tubing. As a rule the tube used was the popular UX-210, although many used the lower-cost UX-201A or the slightly more powerful UX-112A. Although RCA rated its UX-210 at 7.5 watts plate dissipation, there were "bootleg" 210s available that would take much more power input.

What does this lengthy introduction lead to? It leads to an account of a genuine 1929 Hartley oscillator transmitter being brought out of "retirement" and placed in operation on the 80-meter band in the year of 1975! You might think a transmitter 46 years old would not comply with current FCC Regulations.... NOT to mention what most amateurs consider an acceptable radiotelegraph signal. Wrong!

FOR A TRANSMITTER 46 YEARS OLD AND WITH FIVE WATTS OUTPUT, I DON'T THINK IT DID TOO BADLY!
